Fire-Smart Landscaping: High-Risk Trees to Watch

As peak fire season approaches, it's important to consider how landscaping choices can affect wildfire risk—especially in areas like Buckingham and greater Lake County,

where homes are often close to wildland vegetation.

Two commonly used ornamental trees—**palm trees and Italian cypress**—are increasingly recognized as high fire-risk plants.



Why These Trees Are a Concern



Palm Trees

Palm trees become hazardous primarily due to accumulated dead fronds, often called “skirts.”

Dead fronds ignite easily from wind-blown embers
They burn rapidly and intensely, acting like vertical torches
Flames can reach roofs, eaves, or nearby structures
Poorly maintained palms can spread fire upward and outward



Italian Cypress

Italian cypress trees present a different but equally serious risk.

Extremely dense and resinous (high oil content)
Ignite quickly and burn very hot
Often planted in tight rows or hedges, creating continuous fuel
Can produce spot fires that spread flames rapidly



Increasing Insurance & Regulatory Pressure

Even though local HOAs like Buckingham may not regulate these trees:

Insurance companies are increasingly flagging them as hazards. In some cases, coverage is denied unless trees are removed or mitigated.

California's defensible space rules—especially “Zone Zero” (within 5 feet of structures)—are raising expectations for vegetation management



Practical Takeaways for Homeowners



If You Have Palm Trees:

Remove dead fronds annually (no hanging skirts)
Keep palms well away from roofs, decks, and propane tanks
Ensure NO dry debris accumulates beneath them



If You Have Italian Cypress:

Avoid planting in rows or dense hedges near structures
Maintain wide spacing between trees
Regularly remove dead material and lower debris
Consider replacing with fire-resistant species if close to the home



Bottom Line

Palms = torch hazard due to dead fronds
Italian cypress = fuel column due to density and oils

Both can significantly increase fire intensity and threaten nearby structures—especially under ember-driven wildfire conditions.

HOME HARDENING TIPS



Vents

Vents on homes create openings for flying embers. Ember entry through vents can ignite combustible materials in the attic or crawl space, causing the building to burn from the inside out. The importance of ember and flame entry into vents during wildfires has resulted in the development of commercially available vents designed to resist ember and flame intrusion, and recommendations for new or retrofit vents to protect existing openings.

- Use manufactured and California-approved vents (see below) to retrofit existing attic, soffit, basement, foundation, and gable vents, where possible.
- Alternatively, Cover all existing vent openings with 1/8-inch or 1/16-inch wire mesh.
- Common 1/4" screens are ineffective, and should be replaced or retrofitted*.
- Do not use fiberglass or plastic mesh because they can melt and burn.
- Protect vents in eaves or cornices with baffles to block embers, backed by 1/16" wire mesh (mesh alone is not enough).
